St. Teresa of Ávila, also called Saint Teresa of Jesus, original name Teresa de Cepeda y Ahumada, (born March 28, 1515, Ávila, Spain — died October 4, 1582, Alba de Tormes; canonised 1622; feast day October 15), Spanish nun, one of the great mystics and religious women of the Roman Catholic Church, and author of spiritual classics. She was the originator of the Carmelite Reform, which restored and emphasised the austerity and contemplative character of primitive Carmelite life. St. Teresa was elevated to 'doctor of the church' in 1970 by Pope Paul VI, the first woman to be so honoured.

Lebanon Crisis Appeal



Almost 150 people have lost their lives and more than 5000 have been injured by the explosion in Beirut on August 4th. Approximately 300,000 are homeless and over 750,000 have been affected. Approximately 85% Of the country's grain has been lost and hospitals and medical supplies destroyed. Half the population are facing starvation.

Pacific -South East Asia

Philippines - Food packages for city dump settlements

“We don’t have food on the table,” read one distressed message from a pedicab driver living near the Quezon City dump. As day labourers, no work means no pay. Emmanuel International Philippines is partnering with churches in the informal settlements of squatters around the city dump. Having been in lockdown since the start of Covid-19 in mid-March, as the Philippines starts to slowly lift restrictions, EI Philippines has begun distributing food packages in these Quezon City dump settlements. The food packages are going not only to church member families but also to a neighbouring family of each church member. In this way, the churches are demonstrating practically the message of hope and life in Jesus’ gift of love. (*Emmanuel International*)

Atlantic - Gulf of Guinea

São Tomé & Príncipe - Instilling discipleship & mission vision

São Tomé and Príncipe is part of a volcano chain featuring striking rock and coral formations, rainforests and beaches, off the northwestern coast of Gabon. Our workers on these two islands held discipleship courses last year. During lockdown time, they are contacting pastors and church folk hoping to follow up on recent teaching which they gave at a 2-week seminar. The islands have some cases of COVID-19. but to date it is not serious. We ask for prayer for more church members to catch the vision for cross-cultural mission, and for church leaders to engage and commit the church to prayer, member care and support. Please continue to pray that God will call men and women to go to other nations with the Gospel. (*WEC International*)

Pacific- Oceania - Polynesia

Tuvalu - Environmentally and Socially Fragile

Very limited resources, possible rising sea levels and modern/global external influences make this traditional culture fragile, both environmentally and socially. Pray that wisdom would prevail in preserving Tuvalu as a nation and culture, and that the long-standing presence of the Church would play a major role in this.

COMMITMENT FOR LIFE ARTICLE - HONDURAS

Honduras is one of the least developed countries in Central America, and Christian Aid has been working in Honduras since 1997.



Commitment for Life works in partnership with Christian Aid in Central America. Here, we work together with local communities so that they can prepare for disasters, protect what remains of the Honduran rainforest, support small rural businesses to thrive and grow, and advocate for tax reform.

In the early 2000's, Honduras was making steady progress towards poverty reduction. But a coup in June 2009 led to massive instability. Violence began to escalate particularly directed against women, journalists and human rights defenders. Land issues, economic inequality, corruption and political instability became factors blocking the path to progress, along with environmental and climate change issues.

Honduras has nearly 10,000 confirmed cases of COVID-19. But testing is limited, and the public health system is operating under great strain. The centre of Honduras' epidemic has been in Cortes, but in recent weeks cases have surged around the capital of Tegucigalpa.

The Honduran President, a close ally of Donald Trump, has tested positive for COVID-19. It has been alleged that he has allowed the free movement of drugs to further his political career.

In spite of these many challenges, Christian Aid continues its work in Honduras, along with Guatemala, El Salvador and Nicaragua. We work with around 25 partner organisations, from community-based groups to larger organisations operating across the region and beyond.

Our partners include indigenous communities, small farmers' associations, cooperative enterprises, redevelopment organisations, research institutions and faith-based organisations.

Our regional approach works because of the close economic, social and political ties between the four countries. This leads to coherent programming, links between partners and other allies across the region, and shared learning. (*URC Commitment for Life*)




