

PURC CHRISTIAN AID UPDATE

On Feb 8th I took part in a Zoom Christian Aid meeting attended by eight others. Jane Wild, Methodist Circuit leader, had kindly hosted to give us Zoom time. The meeting allowed us to be introduced to Darren Staunton who has taken over from our previous C.Aid area rep for Lancs. The meeting updated on the resignation of both the previous Chairperson, Rev'd John Maiden, and Secretary, Peter Johnstone. Both have given their time and skills over a number of years and we are grateful to them. These positions are likely to be covered by members of the group but, as always, if you or someone you know are interested please come forward and let myself or Barbara know. Barbara and I would also welcome support from those more experienced with online and virtual interaction than we are. I'm sure this is the way forward for charities but personally I am not ready for the challenge!

Darren, as Church Engagement Fundraising Officer, re-assured us that fundraising for C.Aid is still do-able despite these difficult Covid times. Last year £3.7m was raised in C.Aid Week and £1.3m for the Emergency Appeal. Although a lot less than C.Aid's 2020 target it is still an amazing amount to raise given the situation of lockdowns. Darren told us that Facebook and virtual events, Just Giving online and "e" envelopes all worked well last year. These will be in use again this year however it is also hoped that door-to-door can also take place although it will be "delivery only" of envelopes and will always follow government guidelines. Perhaps you would be willing to deliver envelopes door-to-door?

Of course such a lot can change by May but Barbara and I need to give C.Aid Week careful thought as there is another Zoom meeting planned in March for sharing our thoughts and hopefully responses from supporters.

I will of course keep you updated from the C.Aid meetings and will pass on details of any fundraising events that Barbara and I are sent. Cath Greenlees from Longton has already mentioned a sponsored walk/cycle taking place in March that she has organised.

Christian Aid Advent and Christmas Appeal: Thank you

Thank you very much to all who supported the Advent and Christmas Appeal which was for communities suffering from the drought in Ethiopia and for help with Covid-19 protection in Ghana. The amount raised from donations, the Armchair Quiz and the Raffle was over £1800 for which I have had a very appreciative acknowledgment from Christian Aid. Both the drought and the Covid virus are affecting millions in poorer countries - a fact with sadly is not always brought to our notice - and for some Christian Aid is able to bring very welcome relief.

Lent Appeal: Plant an Olive Tree in Palestine!

During Lent we are hoping to raise money for the planting of olive trees through the Palestinian company Zaytoun. £20 will pay for 5 three year old saplings (at £4 each) and the trees eventually provide a much-needed income for Palestinian farmers who are often living in devastating poverty.

(Zaytoun is a Fairtrade company which markets Palestinian products in the UK, including olive oil and soap, almonds and dates - which are available from myself and on our local Fairtrade stalls.)

Sponsored Walk and Cycle: Saturday March 27th 9am - 3pm

Walk for Water or Cycle for a Bike!

It is possible to take part in this event either socially-distanced or in one's own bubble.

The walk takes place in Longton around the Brickcroft. It is under 2 miles in length - but may be repeated up to 10 times. The Cycle starts at New Longton and goes through Little and Much Hoole, Bretherton, (Croston and Ulnes Walton - optional), Midge Hall and back to New Longton, a distance of 17 (or 20) miles. (In the present circumstances, you may need to curtail the route so that you are not more than 5 miles from your own home at any time.) Participants take part at their own risk. They are not covered by insurance from Christian Aid and must ensure that they abide by current regulations.

[If you wish you may devise your own route for either a Walk or Cycle.]

Money raised by the walkers is for Christian Aid's Water and Sanitation projects for which £50 will help to buy a tap and a toilet; money raised by the cyclists will go towards bicycles, costing approximately £63, to take healthcare to remote areas.

As the Church buildings are unlikely to be open by this date, the check-out sheets will be available on the day for the Walk from 16 Franklands, Longton and for the Cycle from 60 Station Road, New Longton or Goose Green Farm, Long Moss Lane, Much Hoole.

Your Church Christian Aid representative can let you have a Sponsor Form at any time. Please enquire for further details

A REFLECTION

HOW TO OVERCOME DISCOURAGEMENT

I stood up and said..."Don't be afraid of them. Remember the Lord, who is great and awesome." Nehemiah 4:14 NIV

Don't just think about the problem, think about the Lord. Nehemiah said: 'After I looked things over, I stood up and said to the nobles...officials and the rest of the people, "Don't be afraid of them. Remember the Lord, who is great and awesome." What specifically should you remember? Three things: 1) Remember God's goodness to you in the past. When you start thinking about all the good things He's already done in your life, your spirit will be lifted and your anxiety eased. 2) Remember God's closeness in the present. What is He doing in your life right now? The truth is, He is with you whether or not you feel His nearness. He said, 'Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you' (Hebrews 13:5 NIV). 3) Remember God's power for the future. He will give you strength for your needs. When discouraged, get your mind off your circumstances and focus on the Lord, because circumstances can depress and discourage you. Chances are, if you're feeling disheartened it's because you are thinking gloomy thoughts. If you want to feel uplifted, make a concerted effort to think uplifting thoughts. Choose some encouraging Bible verses to memorise and quote them to yourself: 'I can do all this through him who gives me strength' (Philippians 4:13 NIV). 'If God is for us, who can be against us?' (Romans 8:31 NIV). 'Everything is possible for one who believes' (Mark 9:23 NIV). Keep in mind that it's your thoughts that determine your feelings, and by filling your mind with promises from God's Word you can overcome discouragement.

WORLD PRAYER NEWS

East Asia - Japan - Church leaders in Japan

Many Japanese Christian leaders are ageing, with few young people in, or pursuing, leadership roles in churches or mission organisations. There are a number of Bible colleges and other training organisations, however all report low applicant numbers with very few young people enrolling. Praise God for those young people who have already answered the call to Christian leadership and for the Bible colleges and other initiatives set up for training Christian leaders. Please pray for more of the younger generation to step forward for leadership, for all staff offering training and for those students currently in training. (Japan Christian Link)

Europe - France - Political Bill

In December, the French cabinet gave its backing to a bill "supporting Republican principles". Although clearly aimed at tackling radical Islamists after various terrorist incidents, the bill is worded more generally in ways that have raised significant concerns over religious freedom, especially for French protestants. Please pray for various representative organisations such as the National Council of French Evangelicals and the French Protestant Federation as they continue to warn of the dangers in the bill and seek to engage MPs. The bill is to be debated in the French National Assembly. (France Mission)

Central Africa - Sudan

Each day, several thousand refugees cross the border from Tigray Ethiopia to seek refuge in Sudan. Many have left family members behind after fleeing suddenly when their homes came under attack. Medair is providing an emergency response to this crisis in Um Rakuba camp to support newly arrived refugees. Please pray for those who have travelled great distances, leaving homes, family and livelihoods behind to seek refuge and safety. Pray that God will heal their broken hearts and help them to recover from the overwhelming effects of conflict. Please pray that Medair will be able to meet their most urgent needs, provide safe drinking water, basic health and nutrition services and psycho-social support to those arriving in Um Rakuba Camp. URC COMMITMENT FOR LIFE ARTICLE

Flood waters have submerged homes in isolated Guatemalan communities such as Alta Verapaz. Many are left without supplies or places to stay.

Esteban Choc Giut, the Indigenous chief of the village, points to some rooftops in the distance. "That roof over there is mine," he says, "and that is the school building. We lost everything, including all of the 500 books."

The Guatemalan Coordinator for the Reduction of Disaster (CONRED) estimates that there are 234 communities left incommunicado following the rains from Hurricanes Eta and lota in November.

CONRED lists 2.4 million people affected by flooding, with more than 270,000 in temporary shelters. Some of those involved in the relief effort have estimated that there could be as many as 50,000 people in isolated communities who are not receiving aid.

With no clean water to wash in, playing in stagnant water and living in cramped conditions, diseases are starting to spread. Health workers who have manged to get through report seeing coughs, stomach issues, diarrhoea, vomiting and fevers, as well as skin conditions.

Rohingya Moved to "Prisoner Island"

Authorities in Bangladesh have begun to relocate thousands of Rohingya refugees to what has been described as a "prison island."

Located at about 21 miles from the mainland, the controversial island facility can accommodate a tenth of the refugees who are in refugee camps in Cox's Bazar, near the Myanmar border.

The island only surfaced only 20 years ago. It has never been inhabited and is regularly submerged during monsoon season. As such it is prone to the cyclones and extreme flooding that regularly beset the Bay of Bengal.

"They have taken us here forcefully," a 31-year-old man told Reuters as he boarded a bus near Cox's Bazar. "Three days ago, when I heard that my family is on the list, I ran away from the block, but yesterday I was caught and taken here," he said.

An 18-year-old woman said that her spouse had put their names on the list thinking it was for rations. He fled when they were told to go to Bhasan Char, she said, adding that she is also hiding in the camp.


