

Many of the children haven't been into a Worship Space, the elders believe this is an opportunity to reach out to the community and hopefully forge strong links.



PURC ECO CHURCH NEWS

The Theme of our Junior Church service on Sunday 21st Nov. was protecting and preserving God's beautiful earth. We can all do our bit in our own homes and here are a few ideas:

Re-cycle soft plastics:

Co-op have introduced a soft plastic recycling scheme which not only allows customers to recycle all soft plastic on co-op products but also soft plastics from other third parties. To check if your packaging is made from soft plastic all you need to do is scrunch it up and if it springs back like this then it is soft plastic. To allow our whole church community to be involved in soft plastic recycling we can now collect these items at church for those of you that cannot make it to the Pope Lane or Lostock Hall branches. Remember: Scrunch it, Clean it and then Co-op it. Once collected all the soft plastic is recycled in the UK into secondary products such as bin liners, buckets and material used in the construction industry.

Other ways you can help:

Bring in your old spectacles and stamps.

Bring in copper coins for Water Aid.

Bring in your empty blister packets and we will take them to Superdrug for recycling. Car share, walk or cycle to Church.

Ideas from the children:

Put all your rubbish in the correct bins for recycling.

Pick up rubbish when you visit the beach.

Take litter home so it does not get in the water or fields to harm the animals.

Help other people to do good things.

Look after your toys and things so that your parents don't have to buy new ones to replace them.

Turn lights off when you are not in a room.

Turn as many electrical appliances off as possible when you are not using them.

Turn your heating down by one degree, put on a jumper or have your heating on for a little less time.

Make things last; don't replace items unless they really need changing. Drink tap water rather than bottled drinks. Put your water in the fridge in a bottle or jug as it tastes much better cold.

Don't waste food products – only buy what you need.

Most Importantly we all need to remember to Reduce Reuse Recycle.

CELEBRATE CHRISTMAS!

I am like an evergreen tree, yielding my fruit to you throughout the year. Hosea 14:8 TLB

The word 'celebrate' means to rejoice, delight in, revel, and appreciate. Jack Hayford writes: 'There is so much done in the name of Christmas that is neither pleasing nor honouring to Christ. Even so, I find myself doing battle... with...religious superstitions which argue against almost every observation of Christmas... against giving...against decorations, trees, or just plain fun, as though such participation defiled something holy. Such harsh debunking is nothing more than "holy humbug". A Christmas tree...is a specific statement...By means of this tree we are saying: We believe in Celebration. We serve the God who "gives us richly all things to enjoy" (1 Timothy 6:17 NKJV) and who through assigned...sacred appointments of feasting rejoicing..."great gladness" (1 Chronicles 29:22 KJV)...Although no one can make a "biblical case" for Christmas trees, we gather around ours with joy. We see in its living branches a symbol of everlasting life given us because of Jesus' death on the tree - whose naked branches crossed out death and ushered in forgiveness...and eternal hope. The lights... gleam a testimony of His Light-of-the-world glory. The ornaments reflect the decorative splendour with which His kindnesses adorn our lives. The star beam's hope, with a heavenward ray, reminding us that from there He shall come again to receive us.' As you gather around the tree this Christmas, don't forget to celebrate the One who said, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me...will have the light of life' (John 8:12 NIV).

Two thousand years ago a child was born, far from home in a borrowed stable, Visited, welcomed by rich and poor, Bringing homage as they were able.


Led by a star the shepherds came to marvel and worship a king, The finest they could bring.


The gifts had their hidden meaning, Incense was laid at the manger, Gold to signify his royalty. And myrrh for sorrow and danger.

A REFLECTION FOR THE NEW YEAR

THIS NEW YEAR, GLORIFY GOD AND ENJOY HIM

Whatever you do, do all to the glory of God. 1Corinthians 10:31 NKJV

In 1643, the Houses of Parliament in England abolished the Episcopal system of government in the Church of England. An assembly of one hundred and twenty-one ministers and thirty laypeople was called to Westminster Abbey to rebuild the English church. The documents coming out of that six-year assembly are some of the most famous in church history. The first question in the Shorter Westminster Catechism reads, 'What is the chief end of man?' Answer: 'To glorify God, and to enjoy him forever.' The implications of that question and answer are profound in their simplicity. And if you're wise, you will make them a blueprint for your life this coming year. Glorify God. Obey God. Enjoy God. When you know your life is glorifying God, you enjoy His presence, but when you know your life is not glorifying God, you tend to avoid Him. And that's bad, because without God's presence in your life, what are your chances of true success? Not good! As you look back on last year, are there things you regret because you know that God was not glorified in them? Well, God is giving you a new year to do things differently. And if you're making New Year's resolutions, base every one of them on the foundation of this Scripture: 'Whatever you do, do all to the glory of God.' If you follow that rule, you will stay on the right path, and you will have the peace and joy of knowing your life is pleasing to the Lord. Whatever circumstances may arise, you will face them with peace and confidence, knowing that God is with you.

URC COMMITMENT FOR LIFE EXTRACT 1

Bangladesh - Update

Christian Aid works hard to shift the balance of power in decision making to the local level. The current international humanitarian system in Bangladesh tends to be dominated by a few, large international organisations. These end up working with sizeable international actors, who frequently ignore local and national actors. This creates an imbalanced power relation between international agencies and local ones. Locals end up on the periphery of a humanitarian response, and all that local knowledge, leadership, and capacity for decision making is lost.

One of our trusted partners in Bangladesh is 'GUK.' They work with locals to enable sustainable change in the livelihoods of communities living in extreme poverty. GUK is well-known locally for its work with women, who are among the poorest of people in Bangladesh. GUK specialises in resilient livelihoods development, climate change, disaster risk reduction, gender and women's empowerment, and good governance accountability. Inspired by the belief in 'release not relief', GUK works with socially marginalised individuals and communities to bring about positive and self-sustaining change.

El-Salvador – Update

In El Salvador, one of the Central America countries supported by Commitment for Life, 25 % of children below the age of 5 face extreme poverty . 36 % of the rural population lives in poverty.

Urbanization is a problem developing countries face as cities grow and become a hub for economic, medical and commercial activity. This causes problems for those in rural areas as they have less and less access to resources. Currently, 60.3 % of citizens live in urban areas. This results in greater poverty for the people outside of cities.

El Salvadorans are also constantly at risk of facing greater challenges due to natural disasters. World Vision reports that the country "experiences frequent earthquakes and volcanic activity, making it known as the 'land of volcanoes." In December of 2013, the Chaparrastique volcano in eastern El Salvador erupted and caused the evacuation of 5,000 people.

Leaf rust has caused problems for the coffee industry in El Salvador, which is an important source of income for the country's economy. Heavy rain and wind carry rust spores from plantations to other plantations miles away.

Commitment for Life has been incredibly honoured to be a Christian Aid partner in support of Central America since we became involved in the region back in 2013/2014. As you know, Commitment for Life will reduce our global regions from four to three at which time our Central America involvement will come to an end.

Zimbabwe - Update on Poverty

Poverty affects 76.3% of Zimbabwean children living in rural areas. Roughly 74% of the population lives on £5.00 a day and the average wage per month is around £230.

Half of Zimbabwe's 13.5 million people live below the food poverty line. - About 3.5 million children are chronically hungry.

Approximately 1.3 million Zimbabweans were living with HIV as of 2016. However, the number of HIV cases has been declining since 1997 because of improved prevention, treatment and support. About 60% of rural Zimbabwean women face period poverty, meaning they lack access to menstrual supplies or education. Girls who experience period poverty miss an estimated 20% of their school life. Due to famine and the HIV/AIDS crisis, the average life expectancy for a Zimbabwean was only 61 years as of 2018. However, life expectancy has steadily risen since 2002 when it was only 44 years. In 2019, two million Zimbabweans had no access to safe drinking water due to drought.

Israeli Occupied Palestinian Territories - Update

Our good friend William Bell, Christian Aid's Head of Middle East Policy & Advocacy, has said, "Palestinians face an even more grim future... Without justice and equality there will be no Palestine and without Palestine neither Palestinian nor Israeli can enjoy the security, dignity and prosperity that all need to thrive and survive."

What passes for normality in Palestine is unsustainable in the face of the inequalities and injustices that characterise daily life for millions of Palestinian people on the West Bank and Gaza. Christian Aid has urged a concerted action by the international community, including the UK government, to help address the underlying conditions that fuel the conflict, failing which here will be a continued cycle of violence and poverty.

The report shows how more than two decades since Palestinian and Israeli leaders signed the first Oslo Accord, there is no peace, with daily life for Palestinians worsening on many measures.





WORLD PRAYER NEWS

Central African Republic - Bangui - the Bible arrives

At the end of September, 15,000 New Testaments finally arrived in Bangui, Central African Republic. The Gbeya, Kaba and Ngbugu translation teams each worked for about 25 years on these, and the 5,000 copies per language could reach almost a tenth of this war-torn country's citizens. Pray for the translators' safety, visiting their home areas to raise awareness ahead of celebration events in early 2022. Pray to the Lord that each copy would impact five, ten or more lives as it goes out, resulting in people's lives changed by this Good News. (SIL International)

Cambodia -South East Asia - Siem Reap Families

One in six people in Cambodia live in conditions of modern slavery, with children being particularly vulnerable. PEACE Team Cambodia, Viva's partner network of churches in Siem Reap, work together to train children and families to help them avoid becoming victims of trafficking. The network equips community leaders to recognise and respond to traffickers. Pray that the network will continue to be a bright light shining against the dark backdrop of trafficking in Siem Reap. Pray too for the rollout of learning spaces to enable children who have been out of school through the pandemic to catch up on their education, and have psychosocial support to help their wellbeing. (VIVA Foundation.Life)

Croatia - Central / Southeast Europe - Reaching the Deaf

There are over 100,000 deaf or hearing-impaired people in Croatia, many of whom feel isolated and disconnected from God's truth. Mario Casni & his team produce Christian TV programmes for local & national stations in that country but would also like to reach deaf people with Jesus' message of hope. That's why they're working with five volunteers who will be trained as sign language interpreters to take part in the TV programmes. Pray that funds can be raised to cover the training costs and that many new people can be reached in this creative way. (Reach Beyond)


WHAT CHRISTMAS REALLY MEANS
