THE UNITED REFORMED CHURCH'S 20th CENTURY HYMN-POETS

Our Reformed Tradition would not be able to worship without the long history of hymns that we use Sunday by Sunday: that history goes back to at least 17th Century Isaac Watts, and continues still in some five prominent Congregational and then United Reformed Church minister-hymnwriters whose work was produced in just my own lifetime.

Albert Bayly, the earliest but least-known of the five, wrote "Rejoice, O people, in the mounting years" for the London Missionary Society's 300th Anniversary celebrations: he was acknowledged by his four contemporaries as "the father of modern hymnwriting", the mid-to-late 20th century's serious hymn-revolution.

The widely-known Fred Kaan's "For the healing of the nations" is sung internationally.

Brian Wren, now the only survivor of the five and long resident in the USA where he taught courses about hymnody, gives us his quiet communion hymn, "I come with joy to meet my Lord".

Caryl Micklem wrote accompanying tunes for some of his own hymns: one of his best pairings is "Give to me, Lord, a thankful heart and a believing mind": his minister-daughter Alison also writes hymns.

And then there's Alan Gaunt who died last month and was the wordsmith of the group. Alan was ordained at Clitheroe, served only in the north including at Windermere: at the national URC Training Centre there, he encouraged course participants to write their own hymns. His wide knowledge, love and appreciation of all sorts of poetry will have aided the elegance and precision of his own writing. "Jesus went to worship in the synagogue" provides for all-age services; his deep and challenging theology is seen in "Eternal God, your love's tremendous glory". Then for dismissal, there is his version from Augustine's Latin of "How blest are all the saints, our God", or his careful and a closer translation from the Swiss-French of what we usually sing as "Thine be the glory": Alan Gaunt focused correctly on Easter's 'resurrection' theme rather than the mistranslation's 'conquering'.

We in the United Reformed Church are privileged to have this collection of hymn-poets whose verse helps us to worship the God of today and tomorrow, rather than be fixed in spoken credal words written fifteen hundred years ago. Their hymns, not least from Alan Gaunt, will remain in books to help Christians worship well beyond our own lifetimes.
